More Sand for National Seashore Beaches

While the Pensacola Inlet Management Plan requires final adoption by the Florida state government, sand is currently being dredged from the Pensacola Entrance Channel and pumped onto the Perdido Key Area of Gulf Islands National Seashore (Johnson Beach) with the operation expected to continue until May 1, 2022. Because of the east to west migration of sand along the northwest Florida coast, the dredged sand should help both "eroded" National Seashore beaches and beaches on the rest of Perdido Key where the eastern portion is "critically eroded." Environmental Notes

Beach Vitex Again – PKA's Key Notes have featured beach vitex several times in the past because of the plant's potential to take over Perdido Key's sandy soil and beach areas. The species has already been identified on two Perdido Key properties where complete eradication is still required. The recent article "Invasive plants wreak havoc in SC" about the Myrtle Beach area of South Carolina shows how difficult a problem beach vitex can be. As spring advances, be on the lookout for sprawling plants with small clusters of violet flowers near the end of branches. Microplastics in Human Blood – Microplastics are plastic particles less than 5 mm and come from a variety of sources. They are found almost everywhere on the planet because of the widespread use of plastics in modern society. For the first time, researchers have detected microplastics in human blood though additional research is needed to determine what effect if any microplastics can have on human health. Burrowing Owl at Gulf State Park — Alabama Audubon Coastal biologist Olivia Morpheth spotted a borrowing owl in Gulf State Park, the first sighting in over 20 years. They are "small, sandy colored owls with bright-yellow eyes" found more often in the Florida peninsula and western portions of the United States. Their numbers have declined in recent years because of habitat loss.
